"The world sings of an infinite Love: **How can we fail to care for it?**"

-Pope Francis, Laudate Deum

In the lead-up to the United Nations COP 28, Pope Francis issued an apostolic exhortation entitled *Laudate Deum*. COP 28 is the 28th Conference of Parties to the U.N. Framework Convention on Climate Change. It's an enormous international gathering of delegates from countries around the world, along with climate scientists and others. At these meetings, national governments make mutual agreements on combatting climate change, with greater and lesser amounts of enthusiasm and commitment.



In Laudate Deum, Pope Francis calls out governments as well as the rest of us for failing to live up to our commitments and responsibility to the Earth. He writes, "If we consider that emissions per individual in the United States are about two times greater than those of individuals living in China, and about seven times greater than the average of the poorest countries, we can state that a broad change in the irresponsible lifestyle connected with the Western model would have a significant long-term impact. As a result, along with indispensable political decisions, we would be making progress along the way to genuine care for one another."

He calls us to recognize that individual actions aren't sufficient, that "it is necessary to be honest and recognize that the most effective solutions will not come from individual efforts alone, but above all from major political decisions on the national and international level." At the same time, our individual choices to live sustainably still matter because they contribute to the cultural transformation— a new way of looking at the world and our place in it— that is needed to save humanity from the ravages of climate change. Pope Francis writes, "...[T]here are no lasting changes without cultural changes, without a maturing of lifestyles and convictions within societies, and there are no cultural changes without personal changes."
