Stop the Legalization of Physician Assisted Suicide

Let's Help People Live, Not Help Them Kill Themselves

For several years, we have been opposing legislation that would legalize physician-assisted suicide in New York State. A bill to this effect has again been introduced during the current legislative session. Several states have already passed similar measures, and there is grave concern that ours may follow.

As Catholics we believe in the sanctity of **every** human life, from the moment of conception to the moment of natural death. We believe that every person has inviolable, God-given dignity. No one should be helped, let alone encouraged, to purposefully end his or her life.

As we gear up to speak out against physician-assisted suicide (PAS), it's important to be clear on what PAS is and what it is NOT. PAS is not the same as allowing natural death to occur. For example:

- Choosing not to undergo another round of chemotherapy when faced with terminal cancer **is not** PAS.
- Administering narcotic pain medicine to a dying person with the intention of reducing her pain is not PAS.

PAS means a physician —who should be bound by the Hippocratic Oath to do no harm— is facilitating a person's death by providing the means and/or the information to enable that person to end her life.

PAS legislation is morally problematic in many ways. It endangers vulnerable elderly patients and people with disabilities who may be coerced into taking their own lives. It provides no counseling for patients with clinical depression whose mental illness may be driving them to this action. It flies in the face of society's suicide prevention efforts.


