CCHD has supported thousands of projects that empower people to improve their working and housing conditions and claim their rights to a decent life.

- a land trust that renovated blighted properties and empowered homeowners in inner city Rochester
- an organization of and for refugees that provided English classes, job skills training, and tenants organizing
- a farmworker group empowering its membership through working to pass workplace protections and
- a wholesale and retail coffee business providing job skills and a supportive, sober environment for women in recovery from addiction
- a workers' center led by low-income people which promotes living wages and assists workers who are victims of wage theft and other mistreatment in the workplace

Our donations will provide major grants to projects like these across the country and grants to smaller antipoverty projects right here in our diocese; 25% of our Diocese of Rochester collection stays local!
